



Japanese Government Policies in Education and Issues

[Japanese Government Policies]

- special schools for non-attendance
- •free schools
- online home study systems
- night junior high schools

[Issues]

- many children are not able to receive suitable education
- •approximately 45% of the families cannot afford the cost of free schools, 400,000-500,000 yen per year.

Solution

- Home Tutoring System -

[Education for Children out of School]

in any situation, including young caregivers, poverty, bullying, etc.

Pros


Device is unnecessary

[Lack of Tutors]

- hiring university students from the Faculty of Education and other majors as tutors
- ⇒ **children**: easy to become familiar with tutors because they are around the same age. getting opportunities to know what it's like to study at a university.

college students: getting teaching experience getting college credits

[Cost]

- establishing a home tutoring system as a national policy
- ⇒the burden won't be place on families
- raising funds to support institutions for children who are not attending school

When providing support, it is important not only to seek for the child to attend school, but also to help the child to think about his/her own career path and to become socially independent.
