What we did

① Research and Volunteers in Iwaki, Fukushima

- Volunteering at “Ohana” in Iwaki City
 - Some cleaning tasks
 - Floor and wall cleaning
 - Toilet cleaning
 - Give water
- What we realized at Ohana
 - We realized how important the shelter is for these animals.
 - They can get enough food.
 - They have a safe place to sleep.
 - They can receive medical treatment.
- What surprised me
 - how friendly the cats were
 - they feel love from humans
- Our feelings
 - We could feel that they truly trust people.
 - This experience changed our perspective on animal welfare.



② Study Abroad to the U.K.

- Volunteering at “Mudchute Park and Farm”

③ Activities in New Zealand


- Volunteers

 - Playing with pregnant cats, rabbits and guinea pigs
 - Preparing towels on floor
 - Throwing away garbage
- Interviews to people in Nelson
 - How did you come to accept pets?
 - Do you have your animal microchip?
 - Do you know animal welfare?
 - Do you buy products that take animal welfare into consideration?
- Observation of daily life
 - Poles for leads of dogs (convenience stores)
 - No dog houses in gardens
 - Fences in gardens
 - Puppies school (“Pepstock”)

3. Gifu(363)

The number of cats and dogs killed in shelters (令和5年度)

1. Fukushima(685)
2. Hyogo(447)
3. Gifu(383)

What we considered

- To stop killing animals, it is important for each person to change their awareness and actions.
- It is important to make pet owners feel responsible for taking care of their pets
- We need to remove negative images about rescued cats and dogs. For example, rescued dogs and cats do not attack people.

Our vision

- Continue volunteer activity (at Ohana)
- Collect money for animal welfare
- Help animal adoption event
- Awareness-raising campaign (Presentation, SNS)
